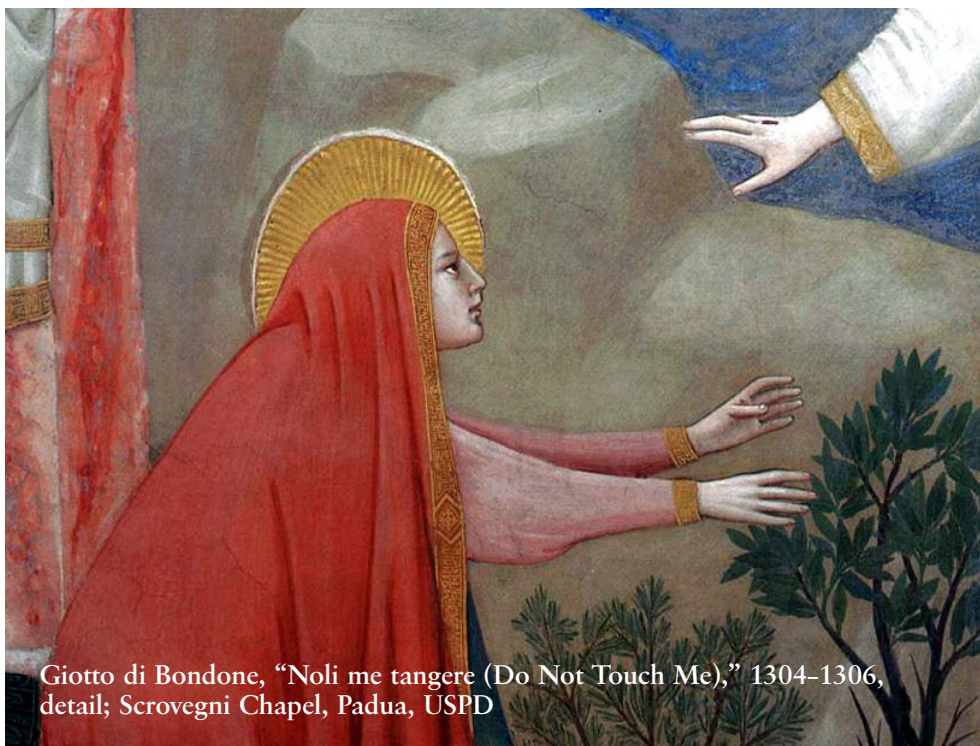

WHAT IS MOST ESSENTIAL

In the Sunday readings during the Easter season, Jesus lays the foundation of his mission in the world through many beautiful encounters with his disciples and friends. Knowing that he will only be with his disciples for a short time, it is as if he wants to communicate to them the most precious or urgent truths about his new way of being present to them and to the world. We can glimpse these truths in the Gospel stories of what Jesus said and did immediately after the resurrection. Each of the four Gospels tells the story a little differently.

In this week's meditation, I'd like to reflect with you on what I see as five essential truths that Jesus desires to communicate to his disciples and to us through His encounter with Mary Magdalene, the disciples on the road to Emmaus, and the apostles in the Upper Room. While meditating on these encounters, it seemed to me like they offered a beautiful window through which to glimpse at what was most essential to the Risen Christ. Personally, I consider them as a sort of divine "to-do" list now that He has risen from the dead: "Don't forget about these things while I am no longer with you!"

The personal encounter with Jesus continues and is enriched even after He dies. The first apparition of the Risen Lord is with Mary Magdalene. "He appeared first to Mary Magdalene" (Mark 16:9; Matthew 28:1; John 20:14). Following the burial of Christ, Mary Magdalene stayed at the tomb, weeping

and mourning the death of her teacher. The Risen Lord appeared to her and said: "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for? She thought it was a gardener and said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni,' which means teacher" (John 20:14-16).

Jesus comes to console and accompany her in her sadness. Jesus inquires about her sadness and touches the depth of her heart. He is totally interested in everything that she is living. Jesus is not even scandalized by the fact that she does not recognize Him right away. For us, too, recognizing the presence of Jesus in one's life requires that a personal journey be made. Jesus then calls her by name. The Risen Lord knows each of us personally and calls us by name in our distress and sadness. She is then able to recognize him. Just like Mary Magdalene, God has given each of us the ability to recognize the Risen Lord present in our lives.

Being a friend of Jesus is to share in His communion with the Father. Before leaving her, Jesus said to Mary: "Stop holding on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and tell them, 'I am going to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" (20:17). Jesus desires to share with Mary the path for which the Father has planned for Him and for the whole world: communion with the Father

in heaven. The trajectory of the Christian life is a movement of gradual ascension towards full communion with the Father. Jesus sends Mary to share the good news with the apostles. In a similar fashion, all of Christ's friends are called to share in this communion, letting go of mundane attachments to allow our hearts to cling more fully to Christ.

Jesus stays with us even when we feel far from Him. The Gospel writer Luke offers a beautiful account of the apparition of the Risen Lord on the road to Emmaus on Easter day. "Jesus drew near and walked with them" (Mark 16:12; Luke 24,15). Jesus came to meet two men who were leaving Jerusalem on their way to Emmaus. These two men decided to leave because their hope that Jesus would redeem Israel had been shattered by his crucifixion. A beautiful aspect of the Risen Lord's action here is that He continues to walk with us even if we decide to leave and walk away from Him. We may have our hopes shattered, but He still comes and journeys with us. Like Mary Magdalene, the disciples did not immediately recognize the Risen Lord. He asked them: "What are you discussing as you walk along?" While they were explaining their shattered expectations, He rebuked them, "Oh, how foolish you are! How slow of heart to believe all the prophets had spoken!" Beginning with Moses and all the prophets, Jesus proceeded to interpret

the scriptures for them to show them the plan of God. The Risen Lord desires to reveal and explain the mysterious plan of salvation to his friends and disciples.

Jesus desires to break into our fear and our sin, bringing peace. The Gospel writer John narrates the Risen Lord's encounter with the apostles on Easter evening (Jn 20:19-23). The apostles were dominated by fear of the Jews and locked themselves in the Upper Room. Jesus mysteriously showed up in the room where they were hiding and said to them: "*Peace be with you.*" This episode reminds us that Jesus always wants to break into our lives, especially those places that we have locked, where we have decided to keep Jesus out, or places we do not want to look at because of fear and shame. He always comes offering peace. True peace of heart comes by welcoming Christ into one's whole life, by making space for Him.

Jesus desires for us to reconcile, to experience the tenderness of the Father's mercy. "He then breathed on them and said to them: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained'" (John 20:22-23). For the Beloved disciple, the encounter on Easter evening is a type of Pentecost. Along with the gift of peace, Jesus transmits to his friends the gift of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is breathed upon his friends for the forgiveness of sins. The experience of mercy through the encounter with the Father's love in confession is to be considered like the oxygen we breathe.

There is no true spiritual life that does not pass through the vital encounter with God's mercy.

We are invited to share in His mission.

In three of the four Gospel accounts of Easter Day, Jesus commissions his apostles to go into the whole world and proclaim the good news of the Resurrection. "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15; Matthew 28:19; John 20:21). He ardently desires to send his closest friends into the missionary field that is the whole world. This is the scope of Jesus' mission! There is an urgency in Jesus' words that communicates His desire to offer His presence and mercy to all men and women.

As His friends and disciples, we can continuously ask for the grace to conform our lives to His to communicate His presence in the world today. As we approach the feast of Pentecost, let us pray to both receive and personalize these precious gifts with greater awareness and commitment. ■

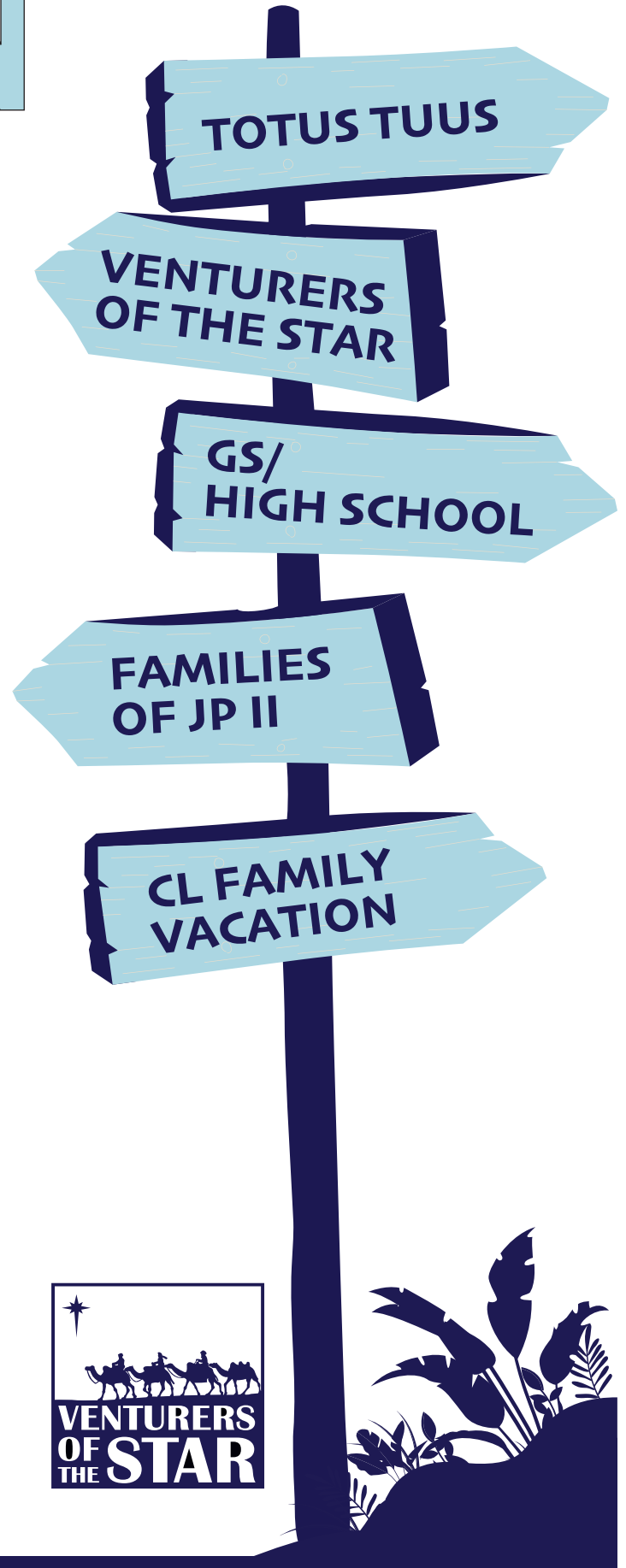

THE FINAL DISPOSITION OF A PERSON IS A SACRED MATTER.

If you have a loved one's ashes that you've been meaning to bury but you cannot afford it, you can give them a dignified resting place at Mount Olivet Cemetery, free of charge. Call 720-684-5270.

Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith teaches us:

- Burial in a cemetery or another sacred place adequately corresponds to the piety and respect owed to the bodies of the faithful departed.
- The conservation of the ashes of the departed in a domestic residence is not permitted.
- The ashes cannot be divided among various family members.
- It is not permitted to scatter the ashes in the air, on land, or at sea, nor may they be preserved in mementos, pieces of jewelry, or other objects.

FROM ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

We honor Mary, Jesus' mom, this whole month of May. On May 20, the Monday after Pentecost, we honor Mary as the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church. At the end of the month on May 31, we remember the Visitation when Mary visited her older cousin Elizabeth, who was pregnant with John the Baptist. This journey to visit Elizabeth with the travel to Ain Karim in the hill country of Judea would not have been easy for Mary. Mary was in the early stages of her pregnancy and had to travel over eighty miles, probably by caravan for safety reasons. Mary went in "haste" to help her cousin Elizabeth and stayed approximately three months.

Farmers in the Middle Ages in Europe sought Mary's help. Have you heard of The Legend of the Ladybug? These farmers were having a problem with pesky insects destroying their crops and putting their communities in danger of starvation. The farmers prayed to Our Blessed Mother for assistance. According to Caroline Perkins, in her June 20, 2023 churchpop.com article titled "Ladybugs a Sign of Our Lady? The Enduring Story of How the Insect Earned its Name," revealed that a little orange/red insect with black spots arrived and saved the day. This insect began to take on various names as "The Beetles of Our Lady" or "Lady Beetles," etc. But in America, they came to be dubbed as ladybugs.

While we may not be dealing with saving crops, our Nativity chapter of the St. Vincent de Paul Society (SVdP) understands the difficulties of our neighbors who need help with food and rent.

Nativity is under the pastoral care of the **Priestly Fraternity of St. Charles Borromeo**, a religious order, founded in 1985 by Msgr. Massimo Camisasca in Italy. The order has its origins in the charism of Fr. Luigi Giussani, founder of the Catholic lay movement Communion and Liberation (CL). Here is how the Priestly Fraternity of St. Charles Borromeo is described by the founder, Msgr. Massimo Camisasca:

Fraternity: “The Fraternity is a companionship made up of people that are placed together by an Other. [...] Each of us [...] is continually accompanied by Christ through his brothers.”

Priestly: “The priestly vocation [...] is a continuous communion with God and man. [...] It acts as a bridge between heaven and earth, represents a fundamental link in the history of salvation, and also serves as an important figure in the journey towards unity among men.”

Missionary: “Mission [...] consists simply in entering within the same mission for which God sent His own Son into the world, for which the Son sent the Apostles, and for which, in turn, the Apostles sent other brothers, until the visible echo of that event touched even us.”

The priests of the Fraternity live together in houses of three or more. The communion among them is meant to sustain their vocation and be a path towards conversion. They are willing to be sent around the world wherever the Church has a need, according to the wishes of the bishop of the diocese in which they reside. Learn more at:

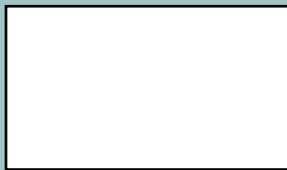
