A WEEKEND IN ROME IN THE COMPANY OF A GROUP OF YOUNG FAMILIES BECOMES THE OCCASION TO BE ACCOMPANIED ON THE ROAD TOWARDS SANCTITY

WE DO NOT BECOME SAINTS ALONE



A few months ago, we hosted a fraternity group composed of young families in the House of Formation. The number of children far exceeded the number of adults, and what's more, they were almost all of kindergarten and elementary school age. For three days, the usual silence of our house gave way to the vitality and joy of the young and old.

Leading up to the visit, we had thought about how to use the time, and what to visit in the beautiful city of Rome. In the end, we opted for the "classic but ever new" downtown tour on the trail of some saints such as Matthew, Augustine, Monica, Ignatius and Aloysius Gonzaga. Aided by Caravaggio's beautiful canvases and the many relics in the Eternal City, some mothers explained the stories of these saints to the 20 or so children (who were all attentive!).

It was a beautiful day, in which both the young and the old looked towards Heaven, beyond those rare gray clouds which, that day, covered the magnificent blue sky of Rome.

The next day, Francesco, a seminarian, explained the mosaic which adorns our chapel to the group. On the part to the right, there are the saints Andrew and John depicted in the moment, which Fr. Giussani loved so much, when they asked the Teacher: "Where are you staying?". The particular detail of our mosaic is that the faces of the saints, which are shown walking towards Jesus, are extremely close, almost fused one into the other, so as to represent a progressive unity given by following the same Ideal. One of the mothers, after returning home, sent me an email in which she wrote: "The other thing that I bring home with me from these days is the image of John and Andrew from the mosaic, who are walking together, where the one is almost

the extension of the other, because we cannot become saints by ourselves."

These words made me think about what I had seen the day before while going around Rome: a group of friends following the traces of the saints, in which the parents showed their children the treasure hidden in those lives and, at the same time, present today in theirs.

This is the true task of every parent, but also of every priest and consecrated person: to show Heaven with their own life. How? Seeking it and discovering it in the depth of other lives.

If it is true that the vocation contained in every vocation is sanctity and that it is absolutely personal, it is equally true that "we do not become saints by ourselves," but together.

The personal path is always sustained by those who went before us, those who accompany us and those who, in some way, follow after us.

These three aspects of the companionship of the Church are all necessary in every step we take towards Christ.

But the opposite is also true.

We cannot truly be together without saying our personal "yes" to Christ.

What does this mean though? Saying "yes" to Christ means accepting His invitation to follow Him through the circumstances that He gives us. Therefore, above all, it is accepting to walk, that is, to change our position and outlook on reality, trying to conform ourselves to Him. It means being ready to risk: in every step, there is a moment of instability, of risk, of launching forward. And all of this embracing our circumstances, which are made up of events but mostly of faces to follow, accompany, guide.

This is the task of every family, of every one of our houses in the world, of every vocational companionship. *Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there with them* (Mt 18:20). Which is to say, where there are men and women decisively walking behind Christ on the road of sanctity one can already begin to experience paradise.

I don't know if it was for this reason or for the grounds of our house with many soccer goals, but one of the children before getting in the car to return home said to me: "I don't want to leave; I want to stay here forever." ■



MOUNT OLIVET CEMETERY

“I have had these cremated remains of my mother in my house for years; what should I do with them?” Too many people ask this question after a loved one is cremated and remains are brought home. While it is the teaching of the Church that individuals, whether full body or cremated, should be placed in a cemetery, this does not happen as often as it should. There are many different reasons people elect to bring their loved one’s cremated remains home- financial, difficulty in making the transition, convenience, etc. Typically, this is not a healthy choice for the grieving process or the spiritual growth of the survivor. In the end, many struggle as to how to respectfully place their loved one in a cemetery.

On All Souls Day this year, Catholic Funeral & Cemetery Services (CFCS) offered individuals the opportunity to inter the cremated remains of their deceased loved ones in the ‘Crypt of All Souls’ in Ascension Mausoleum at no cost to the family. Thirty-nine individuals were brought home this year. Some of the individuals passed away this year. Others passed away decades ago.

If you have a loved one’s ashes that you’ve been meaning to bury but you cannot afford it, you can give them a dignified resting place. On the third Wednesday of each month, a loved one’s cremated remains are interred into the *Crypt of All Souls* with a Committal Service. The number of interred ranges from 10-20 per month.



LOOKING BACK ON OUR 60 YEARS

Nativity of Our Lord Catholic Church was established for 179 Broomfield families in 1958, with the first Mass held in the lower level of the Empire Savings & Loan building on September 7. Two years later, groundbreaking took place for the church. At midnight on Christmas Day, 1960, the first Mass in the new red-brick church was celebrated.

In September 1963, Nativity and the Sisters of Mercy opened a school for over 200 students. It was the first parochial school in Broomfield. Initially, for grades 3-8, the school expanded to include first and second grades in 1973, and in 1981, the Sisters of Mercy departed to be replaced by both Dominican and Franciscan sisters. Recently re-named, Nativity: Faith & Reason is now a thriving school and is under the pastoral care of the Missionaries of Saint Charles Borromeo.

Catholics Begin New Broomfield Church

Construction is under way on a \$250,000 church-classroom building for Nativity of Our Lord Catholic parish in Broomfield Heights. The building, to be completed late this year, will accommodate 700 people and will include four classrooms, nursery, offices and storage space. The building was designed by Langhart and McGuire, Denver architects. General contractor is Wilkins and Co., Boulder. The Rev. George L. Weibel is parish pastor.

DRUGS

A NEW FORM OF SLAVERY

ADDRESS OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS
TO PARTICIPANTS IN THE MEETING SPONSORED
BY THE PONTIFICAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES ON:
“NARCOTICS: PROBLEMS AND SOLUTIONS TO
THIS GLOBAL ISSUE”

NOVEMBER, 2016

I cordially greet each of you and I thank the President of the Pontifical Academy of Sciences for his kind words.

Drugs have inflicted a deep wound on our society and ensnared many people in their web. Many victims have lost their freedom and have been enslaved to them; enslaved by an addiction we could call “chemical.” This is undoubtedly a “new form of slavery” alongside several others that afflict individuals and society in general today.

Clearly there is no single cause of drug addiction. Rather, there are many factors that contribute to it, among which are the absence of a family, social pressures, the propaganda of drug dealers, and the desire for new experiences. Every drug addict has a unique personal story and must be listened to, understood, loved, and, insofar as possible, healed and purified. We cannot stoop to the injustice of categorizing drug addicts as if they were mere objects or broken machines; each person must be valued and appreciated in his or her dignity in order to enable them to be healed. The dignity of the person is what we are called to seek out. They continue to possess, more than ever, a dignity as children of God.

It should come as no surprise that so many people fall into drug addiction because worldliness offers us a wide range of opportunities to enjoy passing pleasures, which in the end are nothing but poisons that corrode, corrupt and kill. Step-by-step, a person begins to destroy himself and to destroy everything around him. The initial desire to flee, to seek out a moment of happiness, is transformed into the destruction of the entire person, with repercussions at every level of society.

For this reason, it is important to acknowledge the problem of drugs – that they are destroyers, they are *essentially* destroyers – and, above all, how widespread are their centres of production and how broad their systems of distribution; the networks that cause the death of a person: not a physical death, but a psychic, social death. It amounts to “throwing away” a person. These vast networks involve people who hold positions of responsibility in society, in governments and in families. We know that distribution systems, even more than systems of production, are an important component of organized crime. The challenge is precisely that of finding ways to control the circuits of corruption and forms of money-laundering. There is no other way of doing this than retracing the chain that

connects small-scale drug trade and the most sophisticated money laundering schemes.

[...] Indeed, whenever we want to shed light on and retrace the web of drug distribution, we always arrive at these five letters: m-a-f-i-a. Seriously. [...]



There is no doubt that curbing the demand for drugs requires great effort and the implementation of social programmes oriented toward health, family support, and particularly toward education, which I consider fundamental. Integral human formation is a priority; it gives people the opportunity to have tools of discernment, so that they can reject the various offers and help others. This formation is directed principally toward the most vulnerable in society such as children and young people, but it is also good to extend it to families and to those who suffer some kind of marginalization. Nevertheless, the issue of drug prevention programmes is continually thwarted by numerous aspects of governmental ineptitude, by some governmental sector here or another one there. There are practically no drug prevention programmes that really work. Once drugs have taken a foothold, once they are rooted in society, everything becomes very difficult. I think of my homeland: 30 years ago it was a transit country [for drugs]; then it became a place of consumption, and indeed a place of some production. All this in just 30 years. That is what comes about when the mafia gets involved with people who hold public office....

Even though drug prevention is a priority, it is also fundamental that we work for a full and certain rehabilitation of drug victims in our society; to give joy back to them so that they can regain the dignity that one day they lost. Until this can be guaranteed, also by the State and its legislation, recovery will be difficult for victims and they might again be victimized.

The neediest of our brothers, who seem to have nothing to give, hold a treasure for us: the face of God who speaks to us and challenges us. I encourage you to move forward with your work and to implement, to the best of your ability, the successful initiatives you have launched at the service of those who suffer most on this battlefield. It is a tough battle. Whenever someone puts himself to the task and begins this work, he runs the same risk as the magistrate I knew in my homeland who received a threatening letter. But we are defending the whole human family; we are defending young people and children. As the saying goes, “in defending the young pups, we are defending the future.” It is not only an issue that affects us here and now, but an issue with deep implications for the future.

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
