his Sunday, we will begin our new liturgical year with the four-week Advent pilgrimage, which will bring us to celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas Day. It can be described as a journey through the darkness of the night in expectation of the arrival of the great light: the child Jesus. When walking at night, it is easy to stumble. One must cling closely to one's source of light. In Advent, our light will grow stronger as we make this journey, and we will be able to see more clearly the path and where it is leading us. During this pilgrimage, we are going to meet some very important companions, such as St. Joseph and the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Archangel Gabriel, the Shepherds, and the Three Wise Men from the East. We are all journeying together, following the light that will bring us to Bethlehem. We do not make this pilgrimage alone!

In this sense, the Advent season is paradigmatic of the Christian life. It is a concrete reminder that we are all pilgrims on a journey towards Christ. The darkness that characterizes this period is an invitation to a greater self-awareness of our personal sin, the mystery of original sin that inhabits our hearts, and the sin that pervades our contemporary world. All of these point to our need for the light of Christ's mercy to enter into our lives. This time also invites us to remember that the truest position of our heart before God is that of a beggar pleading for God to come to bring His presence and salvation. We will repeat daily the beautiful words that express this begging: O come, O come, Emanuel, and ransom captive Israel. We begin this liturgical year as well with the absolute certainty that God has already come into the world through the birth of the Christ

child and that He continues to erupt and break into our hearts and lives through the life of the Church. He does this, especially through the sacraments and the life of the Christian community.

For this reason, the Advent season is a great school. It is a privileged opportunity to discover again the essential truths of our Catholic faith. In this reflection, I would like to meditate on a few Advent practices and symbols as an invitation to live this important liturgical season with greater awareness.

Advent as a time of silence.

Our Advent pilgrimage requires a personal decision from each of us and of our families to make a regular daily time for prayer. This time of silence can be at the beginning or end of every day. It is a moment to step away from our many distractions to be before the Lord, begging for Him to come into our hearts and our homes with His light and love. This time alone or as a family can be spent around a Nativity scene or an Advent wreath. In a simple manner, we can share with each other what we are grateful for and put our needs before God. We can sing a verse of one of the traditional Advent hymns. While visiting some families of the parish, I've had the opportunity to join these special moments.

Advent as a time of waiting. One of the most difficult things about Advent is the invitation to wait. Our culture today has almost completely

forgotten how to wait. The day after Halloween, you could already hear Christmas music in most of the stores, and many people were in a rush to decorate their houses. What is the value of waiting? As Christians, we are invited to follow the liturgical rhythm of the year and wait until the beginning of the Advent season. In Colombia, where I lived before coming to Broomfield, we would celebrate a special day called "velitas" (candles) on the eve of the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception (December 8). This day would clearly mark the beginning of the season. After the vigil Mass, parishioners would gather outside the parish, light candles, and sing Marian hymns and Advent carols. Afterward, families would gather for a meal and place lighted candles on their porches and electric ones in their windows. It was a great reminder that the Virgin Mary is the long-awaited chosen vehicle through which God's plan of salvation is fulfilled. I loved coming home at night and seeing these houses that were keeping watch for the arrival of Christmas. Let us ask Mary to teach us the value of waiting.

The Advent calendar and the Advent wreath with its four candles to mark our pilgrimage are important educational tools that remind us of the newness that Christ brings to how we live and conceive of time. When I was a child, we had an Advent calendar with a chocolate behind every window, and upon opening it, there would be a Bible verse that spoke of the near arrival of the birth of Jesus. As much as I wanted to open all the windows and eat the chocolates, I had to learn the discipline of waiting each day and sharing the other chocolates with my siblings. I learned through this simple gesture that we were waiting and walking towards Christmas together as a family.

Advent as a time of preparation. During the pandemic, I would often meet with my extended family for a time of sharing and prayer on Sundays over Zoom. I remember being struck by a song about the liturgical colors my nephew learned in the Atrium: "Purple is for prepara-a-tion," he sang proudly! How are we invited to prepare during Advent? When we are expecting an important guest to visit our home, we normally prepare for their arrival by cleaning and tidying up our home. How do we prepare to welcome baby Jesus? I

like to remember the story of Mary and Joseph, who, when looking for a place for the birth of Jesus, knocked on many doors, were unwelcome, and only found a place in a stable. Similarly, during Advent, Iesus will knock on the door of our hearts and of our homes, asking us to come in and find a place to rest. One of the things I love most about the Christmas story is the fact that Jesus was born in a stable. Many times, I think of my life and of my heart as being like a dirty old stable, and I find great consolation in the fact that Jesus still knocks and desires to be born amidst the messiness of my life. When I think of my humble childhood home and what my parents had to deal with having five children. I know there can often be many similarities with a stable (smells, cold drafts, water leaks, etc.). Don't let these become an obstacle; Jesus will still desire to be welcomed there with love.

Advent as a time of reflection. Ever since I entered the seminary in 2008, I have tried to follow the major liturgical seasons with good spiritual reading for prayer and reflection. I would like to suggest purchasing the *Magnificat* booklet from our bookstore and trying to find time to spend with the readings. A couple of very significant texts that have helped me to live this season are:

1) Benedict XVI, Jesus of Nazareth. The Infancy Narratives (Ignatius Press, 2012),

2) Benedict XVI, *The Blessings of Christmas* (Ignatius Press, 2007),

3) José Granados, *The Fifth Candle of Advent* (Disciples Books, 2012),

4) Jean Daniélou, *The Infancy Narratives* (Cluny, 2022), and lastly,

5) John Henry Newman, Waiting for Christ (Augustine Institute, 2018).

Each of these great writers have helped me to better understand the mystery of Advent and encouraged me to allow my heart to be touched by the light of Christ.

As we begin the beautiful pilgrimage of Advent this weekend, let us make the firm decision to journey with the Church along the path to Bethlehem to see the Christ Child. Let us pray for the grace to cling to the life of the Church. By letting ourselves and our families be guided by its liturgical rhythm, the light and beauty of its traditional devotions of preparation (Advent wreath, Advent Calendar, Jesse Tree), and the wisdom of its saints, we will experience firsthand the great novelty Christ wants to bring to our lives.



"Behold the days are coming, says the Lord, when I will rise up a righteous shoot to David ..."

Advent is a time for us to prepare, wait, and anticipate the coming of the Messiah. As teenagers and adults, we probably all remember a time when we looked forward to a very special occasion or a milestone. For a teenager, it might be getting a driver's license. For a mom or a dad and their kids, it might be the birth of a new baby or a deployed military spouse coming home.

Anticipating and preparing for the coming of Emmanuel adds meaning to this season. The first Monday of Advent, we have an inspiring gospel reading from Matthew. It is the story of the centurion. The centurion is a man of great authority. He feels compassion for his paralyzed servant. When Jesus tells the centurion he will come to his residence and cure the officer's servant, Jesus is amazed at what he hears. The centurion replies, "Lord, I am not worthy to have you enter under my roof; only say the word and my servant will be healed." The centurion commands respect and action from those serving under him. This officer, in turn, shows great deference, trust, and faith in Jesus (Matthew 8:5-13).

Waiting is not always easy. In the days of Advent ahead, we will be anticipating the coming of our eternal salvation. The centurion shows us by his great faith that all things are possible with God. When the waiting gets hard, reflect on the words of the Old Testament prophets such as Jeremiah. Remember how faith opens the door. SCAN TO JOIN NATIVITY

Nativity is under the pastoral care of the Priestly Fraternity of St. Charles Borromeo, a religious order, founded in 1985 by Msgr. Massimo Camisasca in Italy. The order has its origins in the charism of Fr. Luigi Giussani, founder of the Catholic lay movement Communion and Liberation (CL). Here is how the Priestly Fraternity of St. Charles Borromeo is described by the founder, Msgr. Massimo Camisasca:

Fraternity: "The Fraternity is a companionship made up of people that are placed together by an Other. [...] Each of us [...] is continually accompanied by Christ through his brothers."

Priestly: "The priestly vocation [...] is a continuous communion with God and man. [...] It acts as a bridge between heaven and earth, represents a fundamental link in the history of salvation, and also serves as an important figure in the journey towards unity among men."

Missionary: "Mission [...] consists simply in entering within the same mission for which God sent His own Son into the world, for which the Son sent the Apostles, and for which, in turn, the Apostles sent other brothers, until the visible echo of that event touched even us."

The priests of the Fraternity live together in houses of three or more. The communion among them is meant to sustain their vocation and be a path towards conversion. They are willing to be sent around the world wherever the Church has a need, according to the wishes of the bishop of the diocese in which they reside. Learn more at:
