



I Believe in the Resurrection of the Body



wo years ago, I received a call from a parishioner of Sacred Heart of Mary Parish in Boulder. His name was Jack Wrapp, and he was 90 years old. He was still healthy, his mind bright and sharp, and he wanted to receive the sacraments of Reconciliation, the Anointing of the Sick, and Holy Communion to be prepared for the last moments of his life. Before celebrating the sacraments, he asked me a few questions about what happens to our bodies after death. He wanted to ensure that his body would be treated with the respect and dignity it deserved.

I clearly remember our conversation: I talked about the article of the Creed that says I believe in the resurrection of the body and life everlasting. The Catechism of the Catholic Church at the nn. 988-1014 explains the Christian doctrine of the resurrection of our mortal body extensively. In particular, the CCC says, at n. 989, that "We firmly believe, and hence we hope that, just as Christ is truly risen from the dead and lives forever, so after death the righteous will live forever with the risen Christ and he will raise them up on the last day." Jesus links faith in the resurrection to his person: "I am the Resurrection and the life." (Jn 11:25)

My friend Jack was particularly interested in how our bodies will rise after death. At n. 997, the CCC says: "What is rising? In death, the separation of the soul from the body, the human body decays, and the soul goes to meet God while awaiting its reunion with its glorified body. God, in his almighty power, will definitely grant incorruptible life to our bodies by reuniting them with our souls, through the power of Jesus' Resurrection." And at n. 1005: "To rise with Christ, we must die with Christ: we must be away from the body and at home with the Lord (2 Cor 5:8). In that departure which is death the soul is separated from the body. It will be reunited with the body on the day of resurrection of the dead."

A line that I found very consoling is at n. 1013: "Death is the end of man's earthly pilgrimage, of the time of grace and mercy which God offers him to work out his earthly life in keeping with the divine plan, and to decide his ultimate destiny.

When the single course of our earthly life is completed, we shall not return to other earthly lives. It is appointed

for men to die once. There is no reincarnation after death."

There was a final question that Jack asked me that day: what to do with his body after death? He knew that the Church allows both cremation and the burial of the body, but he was afraid that, in the case of cremation, his ashes would have been treated poorly. Too often, he had seen urns on a fireplace shelf or in some forgotten corner of a house. I strongly agreed with him: the Church requires that the body, or the ashes, be buried in a cemetery, and only there, without delay. Regrettably, even among Catholics, there is the idea that it is nice to keep the last remains of a beloved one close at the end. Some, in order to celebrate the beauty of nature and the circle of life, scatter the ashes in the mountains or the sea. As I told Jack that day, both are erroneous practices: keeping the ashes at home, we never fully entrust to the Lord the life of our beloved; moreover, in a couple of generations, those ashes are likely to be forgotten and abandoned. The wisdom of the Church created the cemeteries to preserve the memory and the spoils of our beloved ones for generations, offering them the prayers of everyone who piously visits a tomb. I have often prayed for unknown people only because their graves were close to one of my beloved departed! Regarding the scattering of the ashes, this practice is deeply contrary to our belief that the body is holy and unique, that we will rise with our own body on the last day; and that there is no circle of life or dissolution of our self into the sea of nothingness. These doctrines go against the dignity, and the glory of the human person fully revealed in the life of Christ, whose body was buried with honor and respect in a tomb!

Jack was very pleased with what I had told him; he called his nurse and asked her in front of me: "When I die, I want Fr. Matteo to celebrate my funeral!" And so it happened. A few months later, I received a call from the nurse informing me that Jack had passed in peace. She confirmed that he had left in his will precise indications about the funeral and burial. We celebrated the service at Sacred Heart of Mary, burying his body in the beautiful cemetery beside the Church. When I blessed the tomb, I lifted up my eyes to the mountains on the horizon: Jack's tomb, like those mountains, was made to last for centuries as a perennial memory of a life lived for the glory of God!

Every year, on the day of All Souls, I go to the cemetery of Sacred Heart of Mary to visit my friend Jack. Our conversation opened up for me a way for a deeper understanding of the mystery of death and the meaning of a Christian burial, and I will be forever grateful to him for that. His tomb is for me a place of peace, of glory, of beauty.





HOMILY OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS

Wednesday, 25 Jan 2023 | SECOND VESPERS 56th WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

Te have just heard the word of God, which has inspired this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Those words are forceful, so forceful in fact, that they might seem out of place as we celebrate the joy of coming together as brothers and sisters in Christ to celebrate a solemn liturgy in his praise. In these days so full of tragic and troubling news reports, we could perhaps easily dispense with such biblical condemnations of the sins of society! [...] That word is prophetic: God, speaking in the voice of Isaiah, admonishes us and urges us to change. Admonishment and change are the two words on which I would like to reflect with you this evening.

1. Admonishment. Let us hear something of what God has to say: "When you come to appear before me..., bringing offerings is futile... When you stretch out your hands, I will hide my eyes from you; even though you make many prayers, I will not listen" (Is 1:12.13.15). What arouses the Lord's indignation to the point that he rebukes so severely the people whom he loves so greatly? The text reveals two motives. First, he condemns the fact that in his Temple, in his name, one fails to do what he desires: not incense and offerings, but that the poor receive assistance, that justice be rendered to the orphan, that the cause of the widow be upheld (cf. v. 17). In the days of the prophet, and not only then, it was generally thought that the rich, who made great offerings and looked down upon the poor, were blessed in God's eyes. Yet this was, and is, completely to misunderstand the Lord. It is the poor that Jesus proclaims blessed (cf. Lk 6:20), and in the parable of the final judgment he identifies himself with those who hunger and thirst, the stranger, the needy, the sick and those in prison (cf. Mt 25:35-36). [...] God is grieved, we might say, by our indifference and lack of understanding.

[...] Brothers and sisters, this admonition of the Lord gives us much food for thought, as individual Christians and as Christian confessions. I would like to state once again that "today, with our developed spirituality and theology, we have no excuses. [...] If, following the example of the Apostle Paul, we desire that the grace of God in us not be in vain (cf. 1 Cor 15:10), we must be opposed to war, to violence and to injustice wherever they begin to appear. The theme of this Week of Prayer was chosen by a group of Christians from Minnesota, conscious of the injustices perpetrated in the past against native peoples and in our own day against African-Americans. [...] It is not enough to denounce, we need also to renounce evil, to pass from evil to good. In other words, admonishment is meant to change us.

2. Change. After diagnosing our wrongs, the Lord asks us to remedy them and, through the prophet, tells us: "Wash yourselves; make yourselves clean; cease to do evil" (v. 16). Yet knowing that we are overwhelmed and, as it were, paralyzed by our many sins, he promises that he himself will wash away our sins. "Come now, let us argue it out, says the Lord: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be like snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool" (v. 18). Dear friends,

due to our failure to understand God and the violence that lurks within us, we are incapable of setting ourselves free. [...] God's grace is the source of our change. We see this in the life of the Apostle Paul, whom we commemorate today. By ourselves, we cannot succeed, but with God, all is possible. By ourselves, we do not succeed, but together, it is possible. For the Lord asks his disciples to be converted together. Conversion – a word that is repeated often but not always easily understood – is demanded of the people; it is communitarian and ecclesial in nature. Consequently, we also believe that our ecumenical conversion grows to the extent that we recognize our need for God's grace, our need for his mercy. In acknowledging that we are dependent on God for everything, we will truly, with his aid, feel and "be one" (Jn 17:21). This is important, brothers and sisters.

What a beautiful thing it is to be open, together, in the grace of the Spirit, to this change of perspective. To rediscover that "all the faithful throughout the world are in communion with each other in the Holy Spirit, so that - as Saint John Chrysostom wrote – 'those who dwell in Rome knows those in India to be part of the same body" (Lumen Gentium, 13; In Io. Hom., 65,1). On this journey of fellowship, I am grateful that so many Christians, of various communities and traditions, are accompanying with participation and interest the synodal journey of the Catholic Church, which I trust will become increasingly ecumenical. Let us not forget that journeying together and acknowledging that we are in communion with one another in the Holy Spirit entails a change, the growth that can only take place, as Benedict XVI wrote, "on the basis of an intimate encounter with God, an encounter which has become a communion of will, even affecting my feelings. Then I learn to look on this other person not simply with my eyes and my feelings, but from the perspective of Jesus Christ. His friend is my friend" (Deus Caritas Est. 18).

May the Apostle Paul help us to change, to be converted; may he obtain for us something of his own indomitable courage. Since in the course of our journey, it is easy to work for our own group rather than for the kingdom of God, to grow impatient, to give up on the hope of that day when "all Christians will be gathered, in a common celebration of the Eucharist, into that unity of the one Church, which Christ bestowed on his Church from the beginning" (*Unitatis Redintegratio*, 4). Precisely in view of that day, we place our trust in Jesus, our Pasch and our peace: while we pray and worship him, he is ever at work. And we are comforted by the words of Saint Paul, which we can feel addressed to each one of us: "My grace is sufficient for you" (2 *Cor* 12:9). [...] All together may we journey along on the path that the Lord has placed before us, the path of unity.
