STANDING AT THE BOUNDARY BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH

This past year, I have primarily dedicated my time to visiting sick people in their homes, to responding to calls to accompany people who are dying in the nearby hospitals and to celebrating Mass in residences for the elderly. More recently, I have been working as a student chaplain in the trauma hospital at St. Anthony's Central in Lakewood. Here, I visit the sick and respond to the emergency calls as they come in. The visits are always very dramatic encounters that throw me in front of the great mysteries of suffering, loneliness, illness and death. The story of the miracle of the resurrection of Jesus' friend Lazarus of Bethany (John 11) is helping me to stay in front of these great mysteries. It is an event that marks in a unique way the beginning of Jesus' journey towards his own death and resurrection, and in it, we can get a glimpse of his new gaze on the boundary between life and death. In these final weeks before Easter, I wanted to meditate on this passage with you!

Upon receiving the news of his good friend's illness, Jesus responds: "This sickness is not mortal, but for the glory of God." These words always remind me that sickness, suffering, and death are not obstacles to the encounter with the love of Jesus. While they are painful, they are privileged moments that put us in relationship with God. They are privileged places for the revelation of the glory of God.

Jesus waited two days before leaving for Bethany, and when he arrived Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days. In the rabbinic tradition, the fourth day represented the moment when the body of the deceased returned definitively to the earth and the breath of life (soul) returned to God. Therefore, the miracle that Jesus did on the fourth day is a profound sign for us that a new "covenant" stronger than death has entered into history. Jesus reveals that in Him humanity is no longer limited by death, but that *human life now has the trajectory of the eternal*. Friendship with Jesus opens up for us the horizon of Eternal Life.



Upon arrival at Lazarus' tomb Jesus was deeply saddened by the death of his friend. In the face of the mystery of death, Jesus was silent; he did not try to console his sisters with nice words, but wept. Jesus' tears reveal his inner struggle in front of the reality of death and his difficulty in accepting it. In front of his dead friend, we can imagine Jesus looking at death head on and glimpsing the whole history of evil and death from the very first sin to the last. Then, at that very moment, in Jesus' eyes, death went from being a normal, natural fact to something strange, frightening, unnatural, and recognized as the adversary: "The last adversary to be destroyed will be death" (1 Corinthians 15:26). He prays to his Father, and we can imagine him assenting again the Father's will for his life to destroy death and the works



of Satan through the events of Holy Week and Easter. In His weeping in front of the world, the fountain of Life began the ultimate victory over death.

When he finished praying to the Father, Jesus called his friend, "Lazarus, come out." At this moment, in front of his sisters and his friends, Lazarus left the tomb with his legs and arms tied with bandages. While the physical bandages remain, Jesus untied the spiritual knot of death that Lazarus had been bound to. He freed him from the slavery of the dominion of death and Satan. This luminous episode prepares and foreshadows the definitive defeat of Death on the day of Jesus' resurrection.

When I visit the sick and dying, the Lord often invites me to stand on the boundary between life and death. The witness of this story propels me to ask for the grace to look deeply into the mystery of suffering and death with the eyes of Jesus. It invites me to unite myself with the pain and interior struggle that Jesus experienced in the face of the death of his friend Lazarus, to entrust the sick to God and to pray to the Father for them with the certainty that they are made for Eternal Life.

In the end, we are all very much like the figure of Lazarus. By our personal sins and errors, we live a real experience of death, and through the encounter with the mercy of God through the Christian community, and, in particular, through the sacraments, we witness the clear victory of Life and Love over the dominion of death. By experiencing God's gratuitous love through the gaze of a friend, or especially in the forgiveness of our sins in the confessional, we are, in a sense, resurrected; we are untied from the knots of sin and death; and our eves are opened. We are freed to live the new life of friendship with Jesus that neither sin nor death can take away from us. I pray that this awareness may grow in us as we approach Holy Week and Easter in our parish.



Only Jesus' proposal to young people, through education and life lived together, can respond to their deepest questions.

Since I became a priest, I have taught Physics and Religion in high school. There are thousands of reasons that make this profession a wonderful job, reasons that correspond to my vocation as a priest. One particular thing is that, by teaching in Catholic schools, I have been able to meet kids and families that I would never have been able to meet otherwise. In America, it isn't easy to meet others. The ideal of the society in which I live is to create a perfect "bubble" in which you don't need anyone, except for those you want to allow in. And because of Covid, these dynamics have become even stronger. Without the school, I would never have met the kids that I have met in these years. High school, in fact, is a place where people who are incredibly different meet and butt heads. My students have two fundamental questions: to whom do I belong? And who am I? None of them has ever read a line of theology, many of them are far from the faith, but these questions burn in their hearts. Gender ideology, for example, is very attractive to the kids precisely for the fact that it responds to these questions, even if it offers the wrong answers.

Recently, I was struck by a conversation that I had with an exstudent, Kiera, who is now working in politics. She revealed to me that she had returned to the faith after high school thanks to the events we had gone to together, mainly the retreats and the outings with GS. She said to me: "Looking back, I am ashamed at how materialistic I was, to the point that arriving at school in a Toyota Corolla was like Mount Calvary to me. It made me feel excluded from the group of rich kids." Kiera had even strained the relationship with her family because they didn't let her have the car at the status level that she wanted. Her identity was delineated by that which she possessed.

I am becoming aware that Our Lord has sent me to these kids to witness to the fact that Christ is the only person capable of revealing to them their own identity, the only one who knows it truthfully. From the outside, I can understand some of the things that move their souls, but it is only Christ who understands and loves them entirely.



It amazes me how a word spoken into the life of these kids by Christ, maybe during an event together or a joke at dinner, can be the seed planted in their heart that, in time, changes it.

An essential aspect of my proposal is to live GS together with them: you cannot communicate Christ simply with words or winning a few discussions, also because the, in America, debates on certain themes are strictly prohibited. The response that Christ gives is only understandable if you see it at work in a companionship that is present. Living a belonging more gratuitous and enthralling than that which the world offers, you can begin to take seriously that which Christ proposes. I love teaching, but I understand that the answer that these kids desire is only found in a life lived together.

For example, with the GS kids, we participate in a charitable work with the homeless in Boston, which Fr. Michael, a priest of the diocese who has become a profound friend, calls Christ in the City. We seek to meet people who live on the street, calling them by name, listening to their stories. The first time that we participated, James, a kid with a complicated and painful history, met a homeless man named Larry. He was shirtless, so we gave him a shirt and he started to recount his life story. From that day on, James would look for Larry every time that he came to charitable work. This is how James has started to understand that his life is profoundly loved, in a way that is unique and personal, precisely in the fact that he experiences the possibility to love in this way.

I am amazed at Christ's method: He asks the kids to gratuitously love a stranger to teach them that they are made of an infinite mystery and enveloped in an immense love.
