# "LOVE ONE ANOTHER AS I HAVE LOVED YOU": MAKING SPACE FOR THE TRUE ADVENTURE

couple of weeks ago while preparing for the weekday morning Mass at the parish, I was deeply moved by the following verse from the Gospel of John, "I give you a new commandment: love another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another" (John 13:34). It seemed like I had a special epiphany: the meaning of life is to experience the infinite personal love that Jesus has for me and to allow this experience to transform and inform all my life, my relationships, my work, and all my actions. The words, "As I have loved you" pierced my heart and caused me to reflect on the concrete experiences in my life where I have experienced the mystery of Jesus' love for my life. I was particularly struck by how the invitation to follow the New Commandment presupposes the encounter and experience with God's love.



As the Church celebrats the feast of Pentecost this weekend, culminating the season of Easter with the descent of the Holy Spirit on the apostles, it is a good opportunity to go to the heart of the "New Commandment" that Jesus gives as the new "rule of life," so to speak, of the Christian community. It is only through the gift of the Holy Spirit that we are enabled to actualize this great invitation.

Jesus' New Commandment is articulated in many other places in the New Testament. Two of the more notable are in chapter 15 where John writes, "This is my commandment: love one another as I love you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:12). As well, in 1 John 3:16, "The way we came to know love was that he laid down his life for us, so we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers."

John the Evangelist gives the New Commandment following the celebration of the Last Supper. He begins this chapter by writing, "Jesus knew that his hour had come to pass from this world to the Father. He loved his own in the world and he loved them to the end" (John 13:1). The Greek word here for "end" can either mean "perfect or fulfilled" or "to the end." Jesus will reveal the "perfect" meaning of love through the two key gestures that occur during the Last Supper: the washing of the feet of his disciples and the complete gift of himself to them through the transubstantiation of the bread and wine that become the gift of his very body and blood. Following the completion of these gestures he will say to his friends, "I have set you an example: you are to do as I have done for you" (John 13:15). Let us look at each of these gestures and ask how they might be inviting me to live today.

▶ Discovering a new logic of life.

When Jesus got down on his hands and knees to wash his feet, Peter immediately refused this gesture. He was stuck in his worldly logic or mindset. Jesus invites him personally to enter the new logic of love and mercy and let himself be washed clean by his Master. Similarly, Jesus wants to take the initiative toward us and invites us to let our dirtiness and sinfulness be cleansed by this humble gesture. Just like Peter we must change and convert from the logic of the world to the logic of love and mercy. It is necessary to overcome a Peter-like stubbornness to learn how to love.

How is this possible? We can look into another sacrament of the Church: confession. When I go to confession, I experience the infinite mercy of the Father towards my life. Just like for Peter, sometimes it is a struggle for me to let go of my pride but going regularly to this sacrament on a weekly basis, I have discovered that my life is defined first and foremost by Jesus' infinite mercy towards me. Through this experience, I have discovered that Jesus is inviting me to let his mercy change my life and to become more merciful to others.

▶ Receiving and imitating Jesus' gift of self. Over the course of my seven years of priesthood, the daily celebration of the Eucharist and times of Adoration have taught me that Jesus truly desires to give himself completely to me and to all his friends, through the gift of his very body and blood. His complete gift of himself through the Eucharist reveals the nature of love as a gift of self. The words: "This is my body," "This is my blood," "Given up for you," and "Do this in remembrance of me" reveal the invitation to receive this eucharistic gift and become this eucharistic gift for others. Jesus gives his whole self to me and asks us, his friends, to receive, imitate, and participate in this gift to others.

In every Eucharistic celebration, I am invited to remember, celebrate, and personalize Jesus' love for my life and for the whole world. I am invited to first receive and experience this love, His total gift of himself and merciful love. As I receive this gift, I am invited to personalize and make this gift the model through which I live the entirety of my life, my relationships, work, and leisure. This dynamic of offering is also true for all the baptized who participate in the mass.

▶ Seeing signs of Him present helps us to live life as a great adventure! In addition to the sacraments, I have also experienced His great love for my life through my family, my priestly community, and my friendships, as well as in my love for nature, art, music, and sports. Jesus has a great desire to continuously convince His beloved children of His complete and personal mercy for their lives. He is continuously knocking on each of our hearts and extending His loving hand to His children, asking them to open their hearts and make space for the true adventure of His love. In this time of Pentecost, I would like to invite everyone to ask and look for concrete signs of His love in your lives. It is only in this way that we will discover and learn to follow the great New Commandment to love one another as I have loved you.



## FROM ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

*In Flanders fields, the poppies blow* Between the crosses, row on row That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing fly. Scarce heard amid the guns below.

From In Flanders Fields by John McCrae

Colonel John McCrae (1872-1918), a surgeon with Canada's First Brigade, drafted this poem during World War I in a region of western Belgium and Northern France. He is said to have penned the poem on the back of a medical field ambulance the day after the funeral and burial of his friend, Lt. Alexis Helmer, who was killed by an exploding shell in the Second Battle of Ypres.

The red poppy, celebrated in McCrae's *In Flanders* Fields, thanks to humanitarians such as American teacher Moina Michael, still serves as a memorial and remembrance to help "Keep the Faith." Veterans service organizations often use the skills of those at Veterans Administration (VA) medical facilities and homes along with others to help make the artificial poppies. These services, throughout the years, have helped to support veterans and veterans charities.

On Memorial Day, let us celebrate our deceased veterans. Our St. Vincent de Paul (SVDP) society also welcomes veterans as valuable members in our work assisting the poor and those in need. We have also extended a hand to help veterans after they have returned home. FIDES ET RATIO

Our school is built on the pillars of Faith & Reason, following the guidance of St. John Paul II expressed in the Encyclical Letter, *FIDES ET RATIO*:

"Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth."

"I think this is a phrase we should all learn by heart. It is very powerful and beautiful, and it contains so many elements. [...] We can be much helped by keeping this phrase always in our mind. I remember once walking along and seeing a large bird fluttering on the ground and unable to fly. I approached the bird and I noticed that he had an injured wing and he couldn't fly. One wing was injured and he couldn't fly. It is the same for us. These two great wings are essential to us. My wish for you is that you soar, in the words of John Paul II, that you soar towards the contemplation of the truth. Remember and treasure these two wings of your humanity: faith and reason, growing them. You need them both. You need them both: this faith and this reason are vital to you to be able to see, to be able to understand, and to truly be able to soar towards the contemplation of the truth."

## CHAPLAIN EMIL KAPAUN, SERVANT OF GOD, PRAY FOR US AND FOR OUR VETERANS!

On the life of the Servant of God Fr. Emil Kapaun, military chaplain, POW during the Korean War, and Medal of Honor recipient, by Michael O. Jackels, Bishop of Wichita, Kansas

Before being sent to Korea, while stationed at Fort Bliss, Texas, Father Kapaun was assigned to bunk with another solder, a non-Catholic. Not wanting to have a Catholic chaplain as a roommate, the solder objected and asked for someone else, but his request was denied. Before long Father Kapaun won him over, received him into the Catholic Church, and even witnessed his marriage.

So far the story is only half-told. The solder and his wife were not able to have children. The doctors said that the wife had an irreversible condition that made conception impossible. After the Korean conflict, the solder learned that Father Kapaun had died in the POW camp, and he and his wife got the idea of asking Father Kapaun to intercede before the throne of God on their behalf, so that they might have children. Three children later, the doctors still insisted that the woman had an irreversible condition that made conception impossible.

Why all the knowledge of and interest in Father Kapaun? The best answer I can think of is the attraction of his qualities of character.

Father Kapaun was brave. He mocked the Communist indoctrination lectures in the POW camp, calmly refuting their attacks on religion.

Father Kapaun was generous. He literally carried a wounded soldier on a long, torturous forced march to the prison camp.

Father Kapaun was good-natured. He worked at lifting the spirits of the POWs and at giving them hope. "Have faith, have faith," Father Kapaun told them. "Don't give up. We'll get out of here someday."

Father Kapaun was caring. He would wash the clothes and bodies of sick POWs. He would scrounge for extra food to give them, sometimes giving them something from his meager share.

Father Kapaun was self-sacrificing. He was captured because he would not leave the wounded GIs, even though he had the opportunity to do so. He died on May 23, 1951, his death hastened by harsh treatment from his captors and by a lack of food and clothing, for he had given to other POWs much of what he had.

Father Kapaun, just like every human being, including those already canonized by the Catholic Church, was not perfect. For example, he expressed the desire upon being liberated to treat a particularly nasty prison commander to a kick in the bohunkus. But it is his qualities of character, seen together with his humanness, that explain why everyone is interested in and touched by the story of Father Kapaun. These are mainly, even heroic qualities of character, and the POWs with him, whether Catholics, Protestants, Jews, Muslims or nonbelievers, found them to be attractive.

There is, however, another layer to Father Kapaun: his motivations, that is, why he acted so bravely, generously, cheerfully, thoughtfully, sacrificially. This can be explained by one word: Jesus.

Jesus gave the gift of himself in love, as shown by his incarnation, ministering as an itinerant preacher, feeding hungry people literally and spiritually, healing their wounds, forgiving their sins and finally losing his life, offering it up and lying it down for others.



Father Kapaun did what he did to imitate Jesus. Like Jesus, Father Kapaun even forgave those who hated him and persecuted him. He told a fellow prisoner who questioned whether they should forgive their brutal guards, "Of course we should forgive them. We should not only forgive our enemies but love them too. If we fail to forgive, we're rejecting our own faith."

Later, after Father Kapaun's death, the POWs who knew him remarked that the face of Christ on the crucifix carved by a Jewish prisoner—who had never met Father Kapaun, but who daily heard story after story about the priest—looked surprisingly like the face of the heroic chaplain. The prisoner who carved the cross thought that this is what Jesus must have looked like: like Father Kapaun.

With his qualities of character and his Catholic faith, Father Kapaun was, as was said about him by his fellow POWs and is now carved into his memorial in his hometown of Pilsen, Kansas, "all man, all priest."


This is why people ask Father Kapaun to pray for them, to intercede for their intentions. This is why they pray with Bob McGreevy, a survivor of the POW camp who shortly after Father Kapaun's death cried out in his need: "Father Kapaun, help me!"

In fact, before he was taken away to die, Father Kapaun promised the other prisoners: "When I get up [to heaven], I'll say a prayer for all of you." And to one of them, who needed to straighten out his marriage upon his return home, Father

Kapaun threatened that if he did not, he would come down from heaven and kick him—well, one can guess where.

And this is also why the petition for Father Kapaun's beatification and canonization was made. For if the Catholic Church were to declare him Blessed and Saint, he would inspire yet more people to imitate, as he did, Jesus' gift of self in love, as well as intercede for their petitions before the Divine Majesty.
