Living Advent entails rediscovering one's own question, but also and above all, walking towards Him who can respond.

his December, I was planning on going on pilgrimage to the Holy Land: I was to be accompanied by, in addition to Fr. Vincent, many friends, some who were celebrating an anniversary, some who were to entrust a particular intention, some who wanted simply to visit, at least once in their life, the places where Jesus lived in his time on earth. However, the war intervened and made these plans impossible to carry out, at least for now. The cancellation of our trip was not but the last in a series of problems: it was clear that the tragedy that was happening in those places was something much bigger, and for this reason, among those of us who were supposed to depart together, the most repeated word among us was "pray." Pray for the Holy Land, pray for peace, pray for the innocent victims, for the hostages. Pray so that something changes in the minds of those people and of their leaders.

Prayer: how often are we plagued by the doubt that praying serves no purpose?

How often do the people we meet, whether children or adults, ask us the same question based on the fact that their requests are not granted? And, what's more, how could I think that my prayer could possibly change the decisions of those who lead nations and armies?

The time of Christmas is always one of the most fascinating and content-rich parts of the year. Among the figures that emerge from the Liturgy of these days, the Magi are certainly among the most mysterious and attractive. Popular tradition speaks of three wise men who come from the East: actually, we don't know exactly how many there were. Almost certainly they came from Persia, modern day Iran, where the term "Magi" meant members of the imperial court, experts of astrology and religion. They incarnate that desire, that need to know the truth that is proper to every man, of every epoch and culture, who seeks in reality the signs of the deep meaning of history, personal history and that of the world. The Magi reached that land, today rocked by war, and asked for guidance from the wrong person, Herod, who himself is the symbol of the man who has no questions, attached as he is to his own power and terrified of potentially losing what he has. But those men proceed on their search and when they see the star that indicates the place where Jesus had been placed, they experience a great joy and can finally bow down before Him and place their gifts. Fr. Lepori [Mauro Giuseppe Lepori, O. Cist, Abbot General of the Cistercian Orderl has written

about how the great questions of man are contained in those gifts: incense is the symbol of the question about God, gold of the question regarding the value of man and of history, and myrrh represents the question about the meaning of death. Therein lie the riches of the Wise Men, therein lie our own riches: above all, of the questions that we have and that we bring to the presence of the only One who can respond to them. And this is what causes the joy of the Magi: having found Someone to whom they can entrust the deep questions of their hearts.

"You just need faith to ask, you only need great courage to ask": these are the words taken from a song, The Beggar, which it is possible to listen to thanks to the beautiful interpretation of our friends [...]. You need courage to do what the Magi did: leave everything and embark on a months-long journey, to reach a remote place such as Bethlehem and stop in front of a manger to adore a baby who was just born. You need courage to make yourself a beggar in front of the most pitiful scene of history and recognize in it He who gives meaning to all things, the Lord of the universe who alone can give order and peace to the entire world.

This is why it still makes sense to pray: it is like retracing that journey of those wise men, who left everything to go looking for Him to whom they could pose their own questions. The alternative is that of he who believes that he can find the response to his own needs in himself and ends up enacting justice for himself: it is this attitude that unleashes terror and violence, just like Herod did in his own time. The Magi went back by another way, a way that was different from that of terror and war, a way for those who are not afraid to entrust themselves and to beg. Because you just need faith to ask, you only need great courage to ask.

REGISTRATION IS OPEN

The Restored Order is when a baptized child—after making his or her First Reconciliation—is confirmed and also receives First Communion at the Confirmation Mass.

REQUIREMENTS:

- Candidates seeking the Restored Order must be a baptized Catholic who is 7 years or older.
 She or he must have two years of Faith Formation (first grade or up) within two years of receiving the sacraments.
- Candidates solely seeking Confirmation need to have one year of Faith Formation (first grade or up) within two years of receiving the sacraments.
- Faith Formation includes Religious Education classes, Nativity (or other) Catholic schooling, homeschool Religious Education, and Venturers of the Star Middle School group.





I have been a neurosurgeon for over twenty-five years, and despite the inevitability of death, most of my patients and their families have largely ignored its inescapable reality. I think we all want a good death, but we are not really sure what that means or how to prepare for it. Some of my patients die suddenly and unexpectedly. Some have months of advance notice. [...] Regardless, they—along with the rest of us—want to do this last thing right. [...]

My purpose in writing this book is to draw from my experiences and to present the Catholic perspective on the art of dying well, while answering some of the common questions that arise. If you have a loved one's ashes that you've been meaning to bury but you cannot afford it, you can give them a dignified resting place at Mount Olivet Cemetery, free of charge. Families are invited to bring their loved ones and lay them in the *Crypt of All Souls*, with a special memorial Mass and committal service.

THE JOY OF THE BEGINNING

As 2024 has begun and chilren have returned to school after the break, we present the reflection by Sr. Marilú Arbesú, Assistant Principal, written at the beginning of the school year.

School starts again.
The new beginning is the opportunity to rediscover ourselves as expected and loved.

The days before the school starts are always intense. At Nativity: Faith and Reason, we teachers spend a few days doing joint and individual work of preparation for the school year, and we spend a day

together on a staff retreat. A lot of work and little time, but the predominant feeling is the joy of seeing each other again after the summer and the desire to start working together with the children and teenagers.

On the first day of school, we welcomed the students at the entrance. Some didn't want to go in, others were "still asleep," and others were delighted to show us their new backpacks. Some students told us their exciting stories about the summer. Many little teeth fell out, and money was found in return! The happiest of all were the parents: they entrusted their children to us with the hope of having more time now to do things when the house was finally empty.

For us teachers, one of the priorities in the first few days of school is to be attentive to the new kids, especially those who experience the difficult transition from primary to middle school and who often find themselves lost in the hallways. One of the students starting the sixth grade was new to the school. It was challenging for him to find his way around. So, the teachers took turns to accompany him from one classroom to another, reassuring him that he was in the right place. After a few days, he settled in and was more independent. However,

he would only leave the classroom after giving a teacher on duty a hug. He needed to be loved, and he let himself be guided by whoever was around. His hugs were gestures of gratitude for having received what he had been waiting for to be loved and welcomed.

All the time and work spent preparing for the start of school is to give the kids a clear message, "You are not alone." Why do teachers want to look at the students like that? It is because they also desire to be welcomed and loved. For this reason, the prevailing experience of the beginning is joy combined with expectation of what the Lord is preparing for us.

GOD'S METHOD An event, not our thoughts

The first chapter of St John's Gospel documents the very simple and profound manner in which Christianity emerged in history: the happening of a human event, the encounter with an exceptional presence. For John and Andrew, Christianity, i.e., the fulfillment of the Law, the fulfillment of the ancient promise in whose hope the faithful remnant of the Hebrew people [...] had lived, the Messiah, the One who was to come and for whom the people were waiting, was a man standing right before their eyes. They had come across Him, they had followed Him, they had gone to His home and spent the whole afternoon there with Him, filled with astonishment, openmouthed, watching Him speak. And when, on their way back, they said, "We have found the Messiah," they were repeating with certainty words they had heard from Him. The fulfillment of the great biblical promise was a man right before their eyes. Event. No word in the dictionary reflects the way in which the "issue" became real, became flesh in time, better than the word "event." Christianity is an "event," something that was not there before and arose at a given point." [...]

It was happening!

Christianity is an event. There is no other word to indicate its nature, neither the word law, nor the words ideology, concept, or plan. Christianity is not a religious doctrine, a series of moral laws or a collection of rites. Christianity is a fact, an event. All the rest is a consequence. The word "event" is therefore crucial. It indicates the method chosen and used by God to save man: God became man in the womb of a fifteen-to-seventeen-year-old girl named Mary. [...] The manner in which God entered into relationship with us to save us is an event, not a thought or a religious sentiment. It is a fact that took place in history, a fact that reveals who God is and points out what God wants from man, what man must do in his relationship with God.

As a way of communicating Himself to man, God could have chosen direct enlightenment, so that each individual would have to follow what God suggested to him in his thoughts and in his heart. This would have been by no means an easier or safer road, since it would be constantly exposed to the fluctuation of feelings and thoughts. But the way God chose to save us is an event, not our thoughts! [...]

Christianity is an event that man comes across, and in which man discovers himself to be "of the same blood." [...] "When I encountered Christ I discovered myself to be a man" said the Roman rhetor, Marius Victorinus. To say that man is "saved" means he recognizes who he is, he recognizes his destiny and knows how to direct his steps towards it. [...] The dynamic of an event, moreover, marks out the way of knowing in each new step it takes. Without an "event," nothing new is known, no new element enters our awareness. [...]

To come to know is to come face-to-face with something new, something outside ourselves, not built by us, something that breaks the mechanism of the things already established, the definitions already given. Cesare Pavese says, "Something external has to intervene in order to change direction." An event is therefore crucial for every "discovery," every type of knowledge. [...]

God became an event in our daily existence, so that our "I" might recognize itself with clarity in its original factors and attain its destiny, be saved. So it was for Mary and Joseph. So it was for John and Andrew, who followed Jesus, taking their cue from John the Baptist. God was entering their lives as an event. Whether they always kept it in mind or at times forgot it, especially during the early days and months, the whole of their lives depended on that event. Insofar as an event is important, you cannot retreat from it. That is how it was with them. This is how it is today with us: an event can mark the beginning of a journey. The event can point to a method for life. It is, in any case, an experience to be had. This journey requires the engagement of the person who is struck by the event, and will eventually reveal the true meaning of what he or she has begun to glimpse: it is the development of a way of looking at things.

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Nativity is under the pastoral care of the Priestly Fraternity of St. Charles Borromeo, a religious order, founded in 1985 by Msgr. Massimo Camisasca in Italy. The order has its origins in the charism of Fr. Luigi Giussani, founder of the Catholic lay movement Communion and Liberation (CL). Here is how the Priestly Fraternity of St. Charles Borromeo is described by the founder, Msgr. Massimo Camisasca:

Fraternity: "The Fraternity is a companionship made up of people that are placed together by an Other. [...] Each of us [...] is continually accompanied by Christ through his brothers."

Priestly: "The priestly vocation [...] is a continuous communion with God and man. [...] It acts as a bridge between heaven and earth, represents a fundamental link in the history of salvation, and also serves as an important figure in the journey towards unity among men."

Missionary: "Mission [...] consists simply in entering within the same mission for which God sent His own Son into the world, for which the Son sent the Apostles, and for which, in turn, the Apostles sent other brothers, until the visible echo of that event touched even us."

The priests of the Fraternity live together in houses of three or more. The communion among them is meant to sustain their vocation and be a path towards conversion. They are willing to be sent around the world wherever the Church has a need, according to the wishes of the bishop of the diocese in which they reside. Learn more at:

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
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
