



RETURN TO ME WITH ALL YOUR HEART

Homily, Ash Wednesday, Feb 10, 2016 (Joel 2:12-18, 2 Cor 5:20-6:2, Mt 6:1-6, 16-18)

Asin is truly a terrible thing. Sometimes we think that sin is sort of okay. But if we were to truly contemplate what a sin is, we would understand that it is truly unacceptable. We would understand that there really is no tragedy that can happen to us in life that is the equal of committing a sin. It used to be asked, would the complete works of William Shakespeare be well lost for the noncommission of one venial sin? The only correct answer to that question is, "Yes, they would be lost." In other words, we would rather lose the complete works of William Shakespeare than commit one venial sin. Why do we have things like that in our tradition? Well, it's because of the ontology. It's because of the way reality is. Everything has its origin in God. Everything comes from God. That which is of God is good, beautiful, and true. That which is not of God is destructive, corrupt, broken, hurtful, and less. This is what sin is.

One of the first things we need to have in this Lenten season is the cultivation of a horror of sin. [...] We would really and truly like to never ever be able to sin again. Unfortunately, that's probably not going to happen. That it would happen but it's probably not going to. When Christ blessed his Church with many, many gifts, one of the gifts was not superior moral standards. In actual fact, Christians are very much like every other people in terms of their morality. This is because Jesus didn't choose to give us some magic bypass on the journey of our freedom to say "Yes" to him. Adam and Eve were given the freedom to say "Yes" to God through that tree in the center of the Garden of Eden, and they chose to say "No" by eating the forbidden fruit. Each one of us has that same dignity and is endowed by God with freedom. To that freedom God makes an invitation to come to him, to be with him, to be united to him. He invites us to live our human condition entirely in him. Our freedom is given to us so that we can say "Yes" to this invitation of God. That is what our freedom is for. That's why Jesus didn't take away sin from us. To take away sin would not have been to redeem us, but rather to disfigure us, and indeed to destroy us. To do so would mean taking away his greatest gift, which is the possibility of having merit to God through our "Yes." To really participate in our belonging to God is that "Yes" that we say to him.

The first reading opened with the cry of the Lord through the prophet Joel. "Even now," says the Lord, "return to me with all your heart." The invitation of Jesus is always there. Always present and always renewed. "Return to me with all your heart." Don't go Adam's route. Don't go Eve's route. God is saying come to me. Come to me and stay with me. Use that freedom with which I created you for the purpose for which I created it, so that you could be with me forever in freedom. Do not use it to destroy and disfigure and hurt and harm yourself. Above all do not use it to say that ultimate "No" to me. That "No" would cast us out of his life forever because God will not compel our reason.

This Lenten journey has this invitation of Jesus at its core, an invitation that we all wish to accept. You wouldn't all be gathered here around this altar today, in the middle of the day, on a busy day of the week, Ash Wednesday, if we didn't want to answer "Yes" to Christ. You wouldn't be here if you didn't want to answer "Yes" to God's invitation. Even now God is saying "return to me with all your heart." There is not one of us here gathered around this altar today that does not desire in the very depths of our heart to say "Yes" to Christ. Yet somehow, we are burdened with

the fact that we know when we go out there today, tomorrow, the next day, and the weeks and months to come, that in so many little ways we will continue to say our "No" to him. Our Lenten journey

is an opportunity and an invitation. It's an opportunity that the Church gives us as a people gathered together to beg the Lord and to ask for the special grace of truly being able to say "Yes" to Christ. You have to understand that discipline is not at the center of this Lenten season. Lent isn't a gloomy season of purple vestments, gloomy thoughts, sacrifice, penance, and fasting. No, no, no, no, no. This is a season in which our hearts are invited to soar!

Holy people everywhere long for the season of Lent because they know what a treasure and a beauty it is. The testimony of the saints speaks of this over and over again. Remember, my friends, you and I are called to be saints. You and I are called to enjoy this season. Not with the enjoyment of selfindulgence but with the enjoyment of a heart that finally finds its place. With the enjoyment of a heart that finally does what the heart most truly and dearly desires to do.

Jesus introduces us to the three great practices of Lent in this Gospel. Did you know that Lent and the practice of Lent are based on this Gospel reading? It's interesting the way Jesus says it. He doesn't say "Don't look for fame, because you won't get it." He doesn't say "Don't look for praise and admiration by the people when they see the intensity of your prayers, because you won't get it." He doesn't say "Don't give alms publicly, so that you are esteemed, because you won't get esteem." He tells us you will get those things. If that's what you want, you will get it. If what you want is fame, you'll get it. If what you want is esteem and honor, you'll get it. If what you want is people to look at you and say, "Oh, what a marvelous person so and so is," you'll get that. But my friends, how low we have set the standards. How low we have set the goal of our heart if all we want is a little bit of human praise. Jesus' invitation isn't to want less, but to want more. To want something greater and better. Indeed, Jesus' invitation is to want something infinitely good, which is communion and life with him. That is why Jesus invites us to engage in these practices with purity of heart. Seeking anything less than the love of God, for which our hearts were made, means our hearts cannot be satisfied.

If you think Lent would be better with banquets every single day in which we can gorge on the pleasures of this world, then do that. If you think Lent would be better by holding everything we possibly can for ourselves and making a few great killings in the stock market, then do that. If you think it would be better to be seen as a great hero of our time, then do that. But my friends, I think you and I know that there is a pearl of greater price. There is a pearl of greater price to be found here. And this is what Lent is about. Lent is about choosing, preferring, and deciding that what we want is that pearl of great price which Jesus used as an illustration, a metaphor for his life and his love.

My friends, let us ask as we celebrate and begin our holy Lenten journey that we may be truly guided through this Lenten season. Let us be guided not by some sort of a feeling or need for self-flagellation, but rather by a great desire of heart to truly be free of all the entrapments that distract us.

Let us ask that we might be given the grace to adhere. Let us pray that we might have God. You alone, O Lord, you alone. As they write over the main entrance to the great Benedictine monasteries, "You alone, O Lord." You alone and none other. Let us ask for that because as Jesus tells us, when we have that, everything else is given to us. We are going to distribute the ashes now. The ashes are a symbol that remind us that life has a task. They remind us that this life isn't just a bit of time that is mostly on the level. Tomorrow will be more or less the same as today, so it would be easy to think we should just eat, drink, and be merry for tomorrow we die. No, my friends, let us find in this symbol of the ashes a greater spur to that prayer which I just expressed, the prayer of the desire for him and for him alone.

ANGELUS REFLECTION, POPE FRANCIS

Saint Peter's Square, Sunday, February 12, 2023

Dear brothers and sisters, buongiorno!


In the Gospel of today's liturgy, Jesus says: "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfil" (*Mt* 5:17). *To fulfil*: this is a key word to understand Jesus and his message. But what does this fulfilment mean? To explain, the Lord begins by saying what is not fulfilment. The Scripture says "Do not kill", but for Jesus this is not enough if brothers are then hurt by words; the Scripture says "Do not commit adultery", but this is not enough if one then lives a love tainted by duplicity and falsehood; the Scripture says "Do not bear false witness", but it is not enough to take a solemn oath if one then acts with hypocrisy (cf. Mt 5:21-37). This is not fulfilment.

To give a concrete example, Jesus concentrates on the "rite of the offertory". Making an offering to God reciprocates the gratuity of his gifts. It was a very important rite - making an offering to reciprocate symbolically, let's day, the gratuitousness of his gifts - so important that to interrupt it was forbidden other than for serious reasons. But Jesus states that it must be interrupted if a brother has something against us, in order to go and be reconciled with him first (cf. vv.23-24): only in this way is the rite fulfilled. The message is clear: God loves us first, freely, taking the first step towards us, without us deserving it; and so we cannot celebrate his love without in our turn taking the first step towards reconciliation with those who have hurt us. In this way there is fulfilment in God's eyes, otherwise external, purely ritualistic observance is pointless, it becomes a pretence. In other words, Jesus makes us understand that religious rules are necessary, they are good, but they are only the beginning: to fulfil them, it is necessary to go beyond the letter and live their meaning. The commandments that God has given us must not be locked up in the airless vaults of formal observance; otherwise, we are limited to an exterior, detached religiosity, servants of "God the Master" rather than children of "God the Father". Jesus wants this: not to have the idea of serving a God the Master, but the Father; and this is why it is necessary to go beyond the letter.

Brothers and sisters, this problem was present not only in Jesus' time; it is there today too. At times, for example, we hear it said, "Father, I have not killed, I have not stolen, I have not harmed anyone...", as if to say, "I am fine". This is formal observance, which is satisfied with the bare *minimum*, whereas Jesus invites us to aspire to the *maximum possible*. That is: God does not reason with calculations and tables; he loves us as one who is enamoured: not to the minimum, but to the maximum! He does not say, "I love you up to a certain point". No, true love is never up to a certain point, and is never satisfied; love always goes beyond, one cannot do without. The Lord showed us this by giving his life on the cross and forgiving his murderers (cf. *Lk* 23:34). And he entrusted to us the commandment most dear to him: that we love each other like he loved us (cf. *Jn* 15:12). This is the love that gives fulfilment to the Law, to faith, to true life!

So, brothers and sisters, we might ask ourselves: how do I live faith? Is it a matter of calculations, formalism, or a love story with God? Am I content merely with not doing harm, of keeping the "façade" in good order, or do I try to grow in love for God and others? And every now and then, do I check myself on Jesus' great commandment, do I ask myself if I love my neighbour as

He loves me? Because perhaps we are inflexible in judging others and forget to be merciful, as God is with us.



AFTER THE ANGELUS

Dear brothers and sisters!

Let us continue to stay close, with prayer and concrete support, to the earthquake victims in Syria and Turkey. I saw on the television programme "A Sua Immagine" the images of this catastrophe, the pain of these peoples who are suffering as a result of the earthquake. Let us pray for them, let us not forget them, let us pray and think about what we can do for them. And let us not forget tormented Ukraine: may the Lord open ways of peace and give those responsible the courage to follow them.

The news from Nicaragua has saddened me a great deal, and I cannot but remember with concern Bishop Rolando Álvarez of Matagalpa, whom I care about greatly, sentenced to 26 years imprisonment, and also those who have been deported to the United States. I pray for them and for all those who are suffering in that dear nation, and I ask for your prayers. Let us also ask the Lord, by the intercession of the Immaculate Virgin Mary, to open the hearts of political leaders and all citizens to the sincere search for peace, which is born of truth, justice, freedom and love, and which is achieved through the patient pursuit of dialogue. Let us pray together to Our Lady. [Hail Mary]

I greet all of you, Romans and pilgrims from Italy and other countries. I greet the groups from Poland, the Czech Republic and Peru. I greet the Congolese citizens who are present here. Your country is beautiful, it is beautiful! Pray for the country! I greet the students from Badajoz, Spain, and those of the Gregorian Institute of Lisbon. I greet the young people of Amendolara-Cozenza and the AVIS group from Villa Estense-Padua. And I wish you all a happy Sunday. Please, do not forget to pray for me.
